

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

THE LAST DEVIL TO DIE by Richard Osman (2023)

This mystery begins at Christmas time. After their celebrations at Coopers Chase Retirement Village. the resident sleuths of the Thursday Murder Club must solve a new riddle: who killed antique dealer Kuldesh Sharma? Their ingenious investigation into their friend's death leads to perilous encounters with drug dealers, fraudsters and hardened criminals. The plot moves fast with humorous intent, but Osman also tackles important questions about the end of life as his leading characters are obliged to face personal sorrow.



SILAS MARNER by George Eliot (1861)

Disgraced and dispossessed, Silas Marner has left his former home to work at his loom in the parish of Raveloe where few understand him, though they value his work. Solitary and miser-like, he cherishes the gold coins he amasses, but one December someone steals that treasure, leaving him in despair. Yet, on New Year's Eve, when the local gentry are enjoying the glorious hospitality of Squire Cass, Silas discovers an unlooked-for gift on his hearth and his life is transformed by the advent of a precious child. As he learns to nurture her, he begins to appreciate the natural world and to trust his neighbours. The healing passage of time reveals

fateful connections between the landowning Cass family and the modest weaver in this lovely village tale.

A THOUSAND FEASTS by Nigel Slater (2024)

With his eclectic account of 'moments of quiet iubilation', the food writer Nigel Slater shares a host of beguiling details about the good bits of life which he has enjoyed in many different settings and in every season of the year. He savours breakfast in Japan and pomegranates in Iran, mangoes in a monsoon, and midnight in Mauritius: these small pleasures may be transitory but recalling them is essential to one's happiness. His descriptions of garden delights are equally persuasive. When he has transformed a 'sad, empty roof space' into a magical roof garden, he does admit however, that

the only access to this paradise is through a tiny loo window. Slater's lighthearted wit pervades the whole memoir 'to distract, to amuse, to give joy.'



Never before has there been a more urgent need for the activities of FOBS to help the school and the community...

In our mission to help raise funds for the school, we run a series of events and activities throughout the academic year that are open for the pupils, their families and the wider community. In our countdown to Christmas this year, we will be running a wreath making evening on Wednesday 4 December and will have our much-loved Christmas Fair on Friday 13 December – both of which are great activities to come along and have fun at. Reflecting the spirit of a community cooperative, Bathford Enterprise for All (BEFA) aims to run the business to make its goods and services affordable to all and seeks to make just enough surplus to keep running. Two things are vital to achieve this challenge: almost everyone

is a volunteer to keep staff

costs down; and the Shop and Café need to stay relevant to the community or people will stop using them. This means that they look to provide as many services as you might expect to find in a village shop: ATM, newsagents, 7-day opening, café etc. They always try to offer a 'basic' as well as an alternative higher value choice of product if available, at the lowest prices they can possibly manage.

There are a wide range of volunteering opportunities at different levels, complete with training. They offer the Duke of Edinburgh Award as well as Match Mentor programmes (where young volunteers are paired with adult mentors), and they frequently provide work experience and references for the young, old, and vulnerable. They are well placed to keep an eye on people, which non-local relatives sometimes ask them to do, and if they notice that a regular customer hasn't been seen for a while, they always try and check why.

A WARM WELCOME

As well as somewhere to enjoy the social benefits of volunteering - working with other volunteers and having a catch-up with customers - the Shop and Café offer a plethora of other reasons to entice you in. The Café is a B&NES Council-registered Warm Space; Rachel the manager says, "If you can't put your heating on - come and use ours!" There are craft afternoons, mahjong mornings, and board game and jigsaw libraries. For foodies, there is a monthly buffet lunch, and seasonal buffet suppers. Or you can just pop in to have a natter.

COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

As well as organising their own social events and fundraising activities, BEFA lets out the Café to local organisations for social activities and meetings. The Shop acts as a 'Box Office' for tickets for local events, as a coordination centre for the deliveries of the Bulletin, collection of Parish Council surveys and as an information hub with inside and outside notice boards. They can take in packages when people aren't at home to receive them and it's the unofficial village Lost

Property Office! Missing something? They might just have it!

KEEPING IT LOCAL

The Shop and Café use local suppliers where

possible. Warleigh Farm Eggs, Solsbury Hill Honey, and Bybrook Yoghurt come from close by, and they

look only a bit further afield for Ivy House milk, Hobbs House bread, and Larkhall and Toby Haynes butchers. Additionally, they offer space in the Shop for local artists and businesses to trial and develop their product ranges. If you'd like them to stock something, pop in and have a chat.





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THE BATH SOCIETY OF ARTISTS ANNUAL OPEN EXHIBITION

The Bath Society of Artists Annual Open Exhibition is now open at the Victoria Art Gallery, running until 11 January 2025. A celebrated highlight of Bath's cultural calendar, this year's exhibition promises an exceptional display of regional talent, and for the first time, includes works by artists under 18.

This year's show sets a new benchmark with a recordbreaking **1,400 artworks** submitted, culminating in a selection of almost **400 works** hung in the gallery.

From painting and print to sculpture and mixed media, the exhibition offers an impressive diversity of artistic expression. Among the many highlights are a beautifully detailed rainbow of over 200 birds, a striking sculpted giraffe's head and neck, and a surprising collage of a cat crafted from Tunnock's teacake wrappers.

What do you write about in the wintertime? Can I repeat advice about not tidying the garden up too much, thereby leaving places for the wildlife to shelter - didn't you listen to me last time?

Anyway, did you notice autumn? Wasn't it stunning. We had been in Canada in October, and although the display of maple leaves was

very impressive, it wasn't any better than here in this country, even here in Bathford. It just shows how surprisingly good mother nature can be when she tries - as long as you get out there and pay attention.

The only festive thing worth mentioning is the AGM for the Bathford Flower Show that I want to turn into a party in the New Year at 19:30 on 15 January in the Bathford Parish Hall - are you up for that?

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ANN NELSON'S TOMB AT ST.SWITHUN'S

Did you know that Ann Nelson, sister of Britain's naval hero, Lord Horatio Nelson, is buried in a tomb in St. Swithun's churchyard?

Ann was born in Burnham Thorpe, Norfolk in 1760. the daughter of the local pastor, the Reverend Edmund Nelson, and his wife Catherine. The Nelson family were physically fragile. Her father had a weak and sickly constitution. Her mother died when she was seven and three of her siblings also died. But she had four older siblings - including Horatio, and three younger. But we know little about Ann, or 'Nan' as she was known by the family.

Although a man of limited means, her father Edmund was concerned to put his offspring in worthwhile positions upon their completion of basic schooling.



In 1775, 14-year-old Ann was apprenticed to a London milliner. Upon completion, she became a Free Woman of the City of London. Her fortunes improved in 1778 when she became the beneficiary of two legacies of around £2,000, a sum roughly equivalent to half a million pounds today.

Ann spent the remainder of her short life with her father, either in Norfolk, or in Bath, where her father increasingly spent much of his time trying to sustain his poor health. One cold evening In October 1783, Ann left a warm ballroom in Bath where she had been dancing and caught a severe chill which quickly turned into pneumonia.

She died on 15 November 1783 and was buried at St. Swithun's with her father and remaining sister present. Captain Horatio Nelson, who

was in France at the time, wrote to a friend "I have been very near coming to England occasioned by the melancholy account of my dear sister's death."

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BATHFORD SOCIETY Review of October's talk by Glennis Naylor on the History of Claverton

The Bathford Society enjoyed an absorbing talk on the History of Claverton by local historian and Claverton Parish Councillor, Glennis Naylor. Here's a few facts that emerged:

- **1.** To the Romans, it was a place for growing wine, a tradition that continued to the seventeenth century.
- 2. None of the houses in Claverton have numbers and the deliverers still have to deal with a confusing medley of house names.
- **3.** After the Norman Conquest, Claverton was awarded to one of the Domesday Commissioners as a hunting ground, a fact commemorated to this day by the proliferation of rabbit warrens just uphill from the village.
- **4.** Claverton was the site of a significant skirmish before the Battle of Lansdown in the Civil War. General Waller's men dug defensive positions into the hillside, and they are visible to this day.
- **5.** The old Manor House was demolished because it was in poor condition and replaced by what is now the American Museum.

Bathford Mill is recorded in the Domesday Book and was probably in operation for many years before that date. It then owned 12 acres of "Meadow" and was worth ten pounds, a sum today that is incalculable. It used to grind, amongst others, corn and fuller's earth and was an important source of employment in the village. Today, it is a high-tech, high-value enterprise, producing security paper for passports, certificates etc for an international market. Andy will tell the story of the Mill; past, present and future.

Remembering SHIRLEY STRANGE (NEE BLANCHARD) 30/11/1935 - 2/10/2024

Shirley was born at home, 1 Ashley Road, Bathford to parents John and Queenie Blanchard. Her brother Jack was born 7 years later.

Shirley had a vivid memory of visiting Bristol with her mother and grandmother during the war. The air raid siren started, and they ran for cover, spending the night in the cellar of a pub. They emerged the following morning to find utter devastation around them. It was a lucky escape.

Shirley attended Oldfield Girls' School and later the secretarial college. As a teenager she met Ken Strange who lived in High Street, Bathford. They were married in August 1955 at St. Swithun's Church. Ken joined the Army, and the newlyweds were posted to Singapore - a huge adventure for them both. Later postings included Kenya, Hong Kong and Germany. During these years their three daughters were born – Ann, Lynn and Melanie.

Home was always Bathford and times between postings were spent here with their families. Ken died in 2020, and Shirley lived alone in Ashley Road. She fell and fractured her hip in June this year and became unwell as a

became unwell as result. She died peacefully on 2 October and is greatly missed by her family and many friends.

ASK THE TRAINER Your questions answered

Q. What are the pros and cons of raw feeding?

Canine nutrition is a huge and hotly debated topic, with raw food becoming increasingly popular.

Commercially produced raw diets are more likely than home-made diets to be complete and balanced, containing all necessary nutrients. As always, consider your own dog: their age, breed, activity level and medical status. Any diet changes should be made gradually. For those with the energy, check out Dr Conor Brady's book: 'Feeding Dogs'. Alternatively, here's a brief overview of some of the potential pros and cons of raw feeding:
